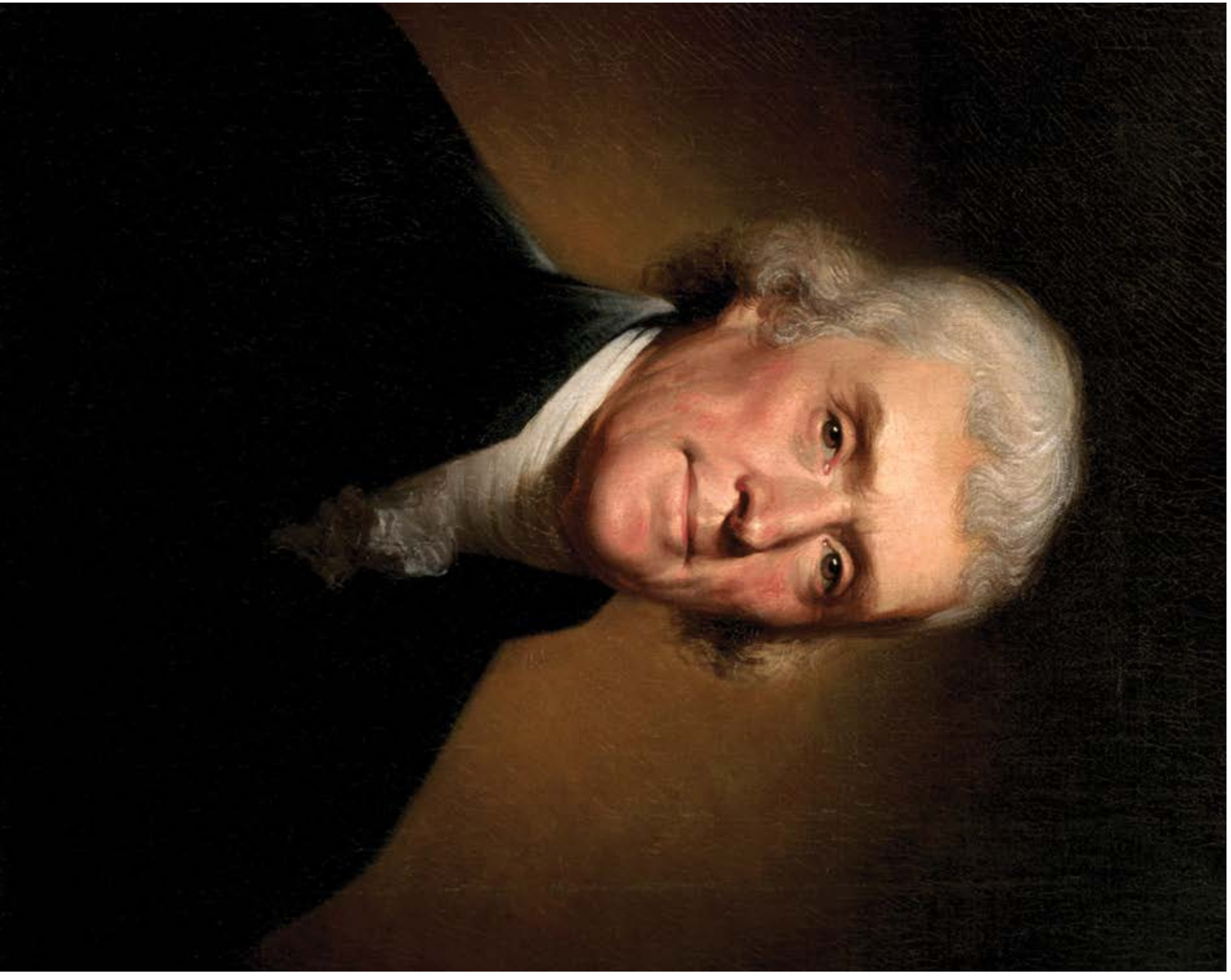

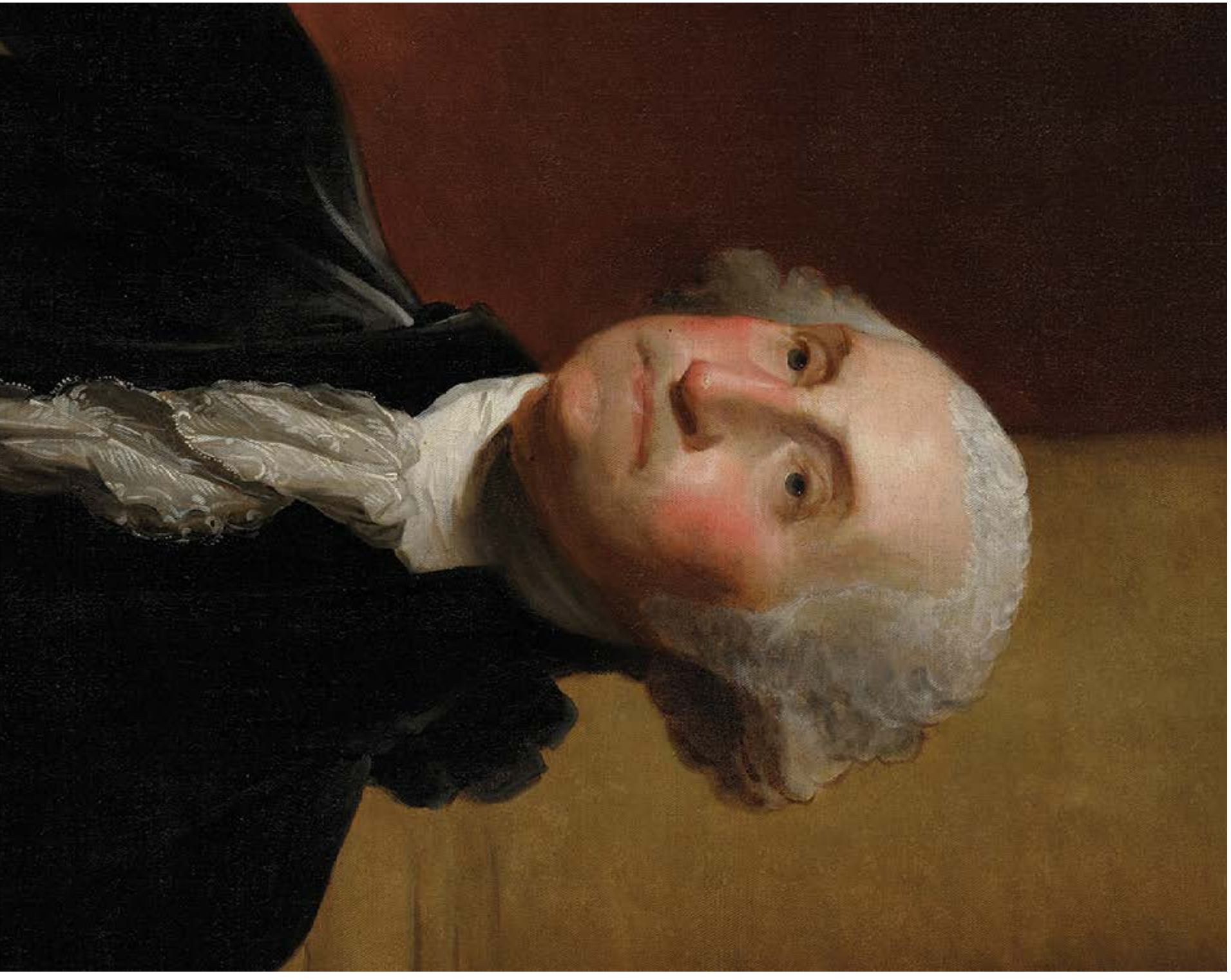

The People

of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquillity, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do hereby constitute and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

Article I

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Article II

Section 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold Office, during the Term of Years which is limited by the Constitution, and he shall, when he takes the Oath of Office, swear to support the Constitution.

Section 2. The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Militia of the several States to march or camp, in pursuance of the Acts of Congress, and he may execute the same. He may grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offences against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment. He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint and dismiss Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are in his Power; but he shall have the Power to fill up any Vacancies that may happen during the recess of the Senate, by granting Commissions which shall expire at the next Session of the Senate.

Article III

Section 1. The judicial Power shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at any time during their Continuance in Office, receive a Compensation, which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in Office.

Article IV

Section 1. No State shall be deprived of Territory, equal in Population to the whole or a Part thereof, in any Manner.

Article V

Section 1. The Congress, whenever two thirds of both Houses present, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution, which, when ratified by the Legislatures of three fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three fourths thereof, which in any State, may be called for that Purpose, shall be valid, as part of this Constitution.

Article VI

Section 1. This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

Article VII

Section 1. The Ratification of the States, which shall have attained to the Number of nine, shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the same.

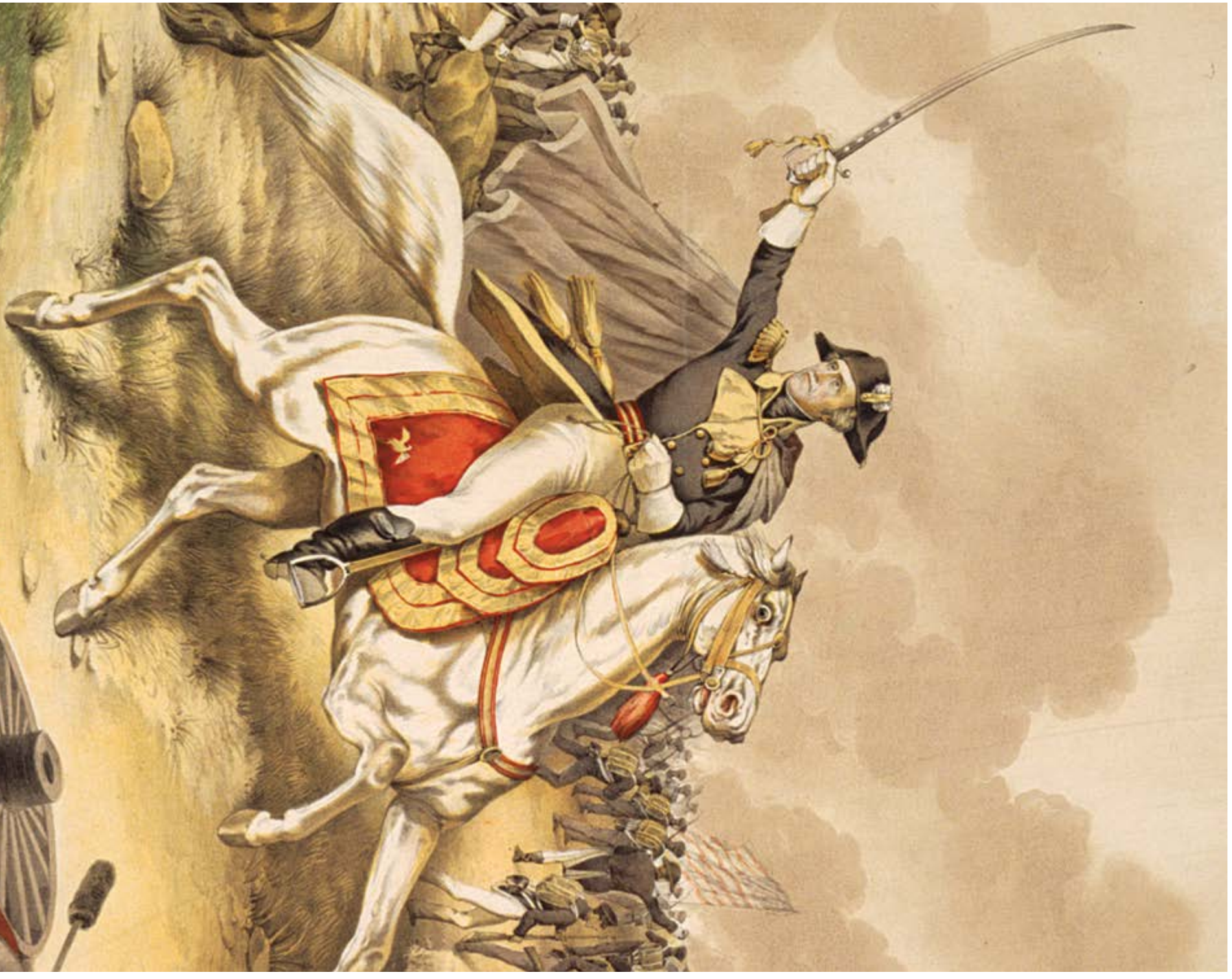

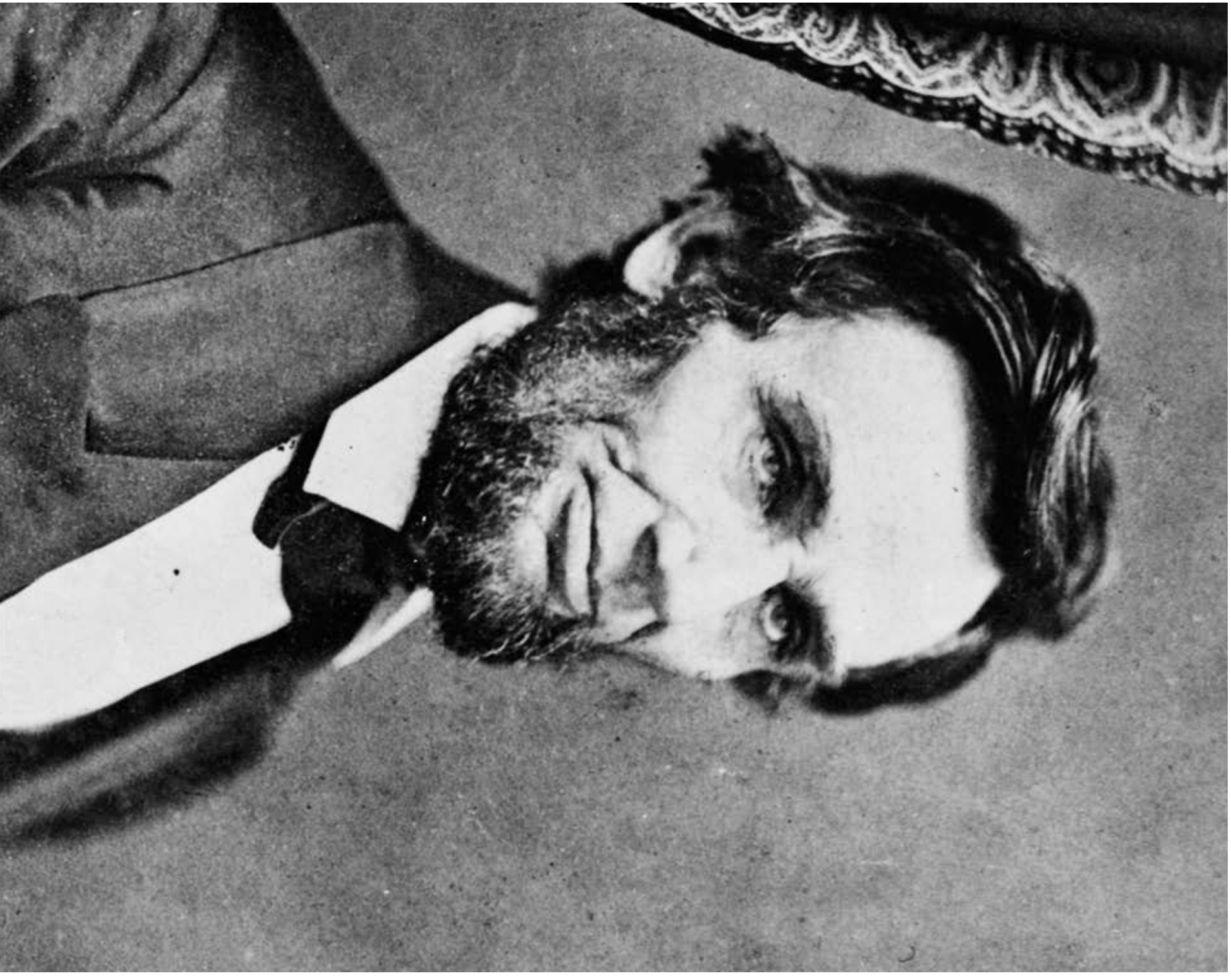
